Winter Driving Tips

- **Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.**
- **Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.**
- **Make certain your tires are properly inflated.**
- **Never mix radial tires with other tire types.**
- **Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-up.**
- **If possible, avoid using your parking brake in cold, rainy and snowy weather.**
- **Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).**
- **Always look and steer where you want to go.**
- **Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle.**

MUSEUM HOSTS RESOURCE FAIR FOR PARENTS OF YOUNG CHILDREN

Liftoff to Learning, a free, drop-in resource fair, will be held Monday, February 1st at the High Point Museum. There will be two sessions 11 am to 1 pm and 5 pm to 7 pm.

Beginning in 2008 as Kickoff to Kindergarten: Parent Day, this event has evolved over the past eight years and is getting a new name in 2016 to reflect its broader scope. This program is geared to parents of all preschoolers, not just those of rising kindergarten students.

Guilford County Schools, Guilford Parent Academy, Guilford Education Alliance, Guilford Child Development, Guilford Partnership for Children, United Way of Greater High Point Children's Initiatives, Say Yes Guilford, Ready for School-Ready for Life, Greensboro Children's Museum and High Point Museum have teamed up to help parents navigate the potentially overwhelming transition to kindergarten. They have brought together in one place; a wealth of information and resources for parents to consult. Parents will be able to speak directly to professionals about a variety of issues facing their children.

PUBLIC SERVICES MATERIAL RECOVERY



Over the past few weeks the Material Recovery Facility has received 3.85 tons of electronics. The high tonnages are due to the Christmas Holiday electronics purchases.

Due to the Christmas Holidays, the MRF has received a larger volume of single stream materials.



PUBLIC SERVICES ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

In December, the City of High Point collected and responded to:

- 145 tons of yard waste
- 1,188 tons of garbage/trash
- 101 tons of bulk items (sofas/chairs/mattresses)
- 355 tons of recyclables at curbside
- 8 requests to clean up illegal dump sites
- Anticipation of an increase in electronics being illegally dumped after Christmas

CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL

The City has collected over 4800 trees from the Holiday. Wreaths, garland and artificial trees are not accepted. The trees will be turned into mulch for use at parks and other facilities.

The City of High Point collects trees curbside through January 31, 2016.



HIGH POINT PUBLIC LIBRARY

The City of High Point Public Library, with a generous donation made by the Friends of the Library, presented High Point Regional Hospital with a gift of movies and children's books. The books will reside in the newly renovated Pediatric Inpatient Unit and be available for children and families staying in this wing of the hospital. The hospital's goal was to provide a kid friendly unit that will allow their patients to feel as comfortable as possible during their stay. The Library is excited about this opportunity to help out the local children of our community!

PROGRAM AND ELIGIBILITY


- Down Payment/Closing Cost Assistance in the amount of **\$7,500**
- 5 Year deferred loan at 0% interest
- Loan forgiven at 20% per year for each full year you live in the home
- Property must be primary residence
- Property sales price not to exceed \$200,000
- Complete 8 hours pre-purchase home buyer education
- Obtain a home loan from a Participating Lender (list provided at HighPointNC.gov/cd)
- Purchase property within the Core City

PROGRAM AND ELIGIBILITY

- Down Payment/Closing Cost Assistance in the amount of **\$15,000**
- You are a first time home buyer (or have not owned a home in the past 3 years)
- Your income doesn't exceed certain limits
1-2 persons \$67,500 / 3+ Persons \$78,000
- You purchase an existing home below \$245,000
- Your credit score is 640 or higher
- You complete an in-person or online home buyer education course
- Purchase property within Guilford County
