

**CITY OF HIGH POINT THIRD AMENDED DECLARATION OF A STATE OF
EMERGENCY “STAY AT HOME” ORDER**

WHEREAS, The North Carolina General Assembly has adopted Article 1A of Chapter 166A of the General Statutes, entitled “North Carolina Emergency Management Act”, which sets forth the authority and responsibility of the Governor, State agencies, and local governments in prevention of, preparation for, response to, and recovery from natural or man-made emergencies, including the declaration of a state of emergency; and

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has created a state of emergency in the City of High Point; and

WHEREAS, the Governor declared a state of emergency on behalf of the state of North Carolina on March 10, 2020, and has since adopted additional Executive Orders relating to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 30, 2020, the City of High Point (“City”) adopted the City of High Point Second Amended Declaration of a State of Emergency “Stay at Home” Order (“Second Amended “Stay at Home Order”) in order to impose further restrictions and prohibitions necessary to maintain order and protect public health, safety and welfare and to secure property within the City, related to (“COVID-19”); and

WHEREAS, as part of the Second Amended “Stay at Home” Order, the City of High Point adopted Guilford County’s Second Revised Proclamation, dated March 30, 2020, to be enforced within the entire City limits of the City of High Point, regardless of which county an area of the City may be located; and

WHEREAS, April 10, 2020 Guilford County adopted the Third Revised Proclamation, setting forth certain directions necessary to slow the rate of the spread of COVID-19; and

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as the Mayor of the City of High Point under Article 1A of Chapter 166A of the North Carolina General Statutes and Title 5 Public Safety; Chapter 3 Emergency Management; Section 5-3-5(b) and (c) of the City of High Point Code of Ordinances:

Section 1. I hereby amend the City of High Point’s Second Amended “Stay at Home” Order to acknowledge and incorporate Guilford County’s Third Revised Proclamation; and

Section 2. I order that the City of High Point adopts Guilford County’s Third Revised Proclamation, dated April 10, 2020, and any and all possible related amendments hereafter to be enforced within the entire City limits of the City of High Point, regardless of which county an area of the City may be located; and


Section 3. I hereby order all City law enforcement officers and employees and all other emergency management personnel subject to our control to cooperate in the enforcement and implementation of the provisions of this Declaration, all applicable local ordinances, state and federal laws, and the City of High Point Emergency Operations Plan.

Section 4. I hereby order this declaration: (a) to be distributed to the news media and other organizations calculated to bring its contents to the attention of the general public; (b) to be filed with Clerk to the City of High Point and (c) to be distributed to others as necessary to ensure proper implementation of this declaration.

Section 5. This Third Amended Declaration shall take effect on the 10th day of April at 5:00 pm, and shall remain in effect through the 16th day of April, 2020 until 12:01 a.m., but will be regularly reviewed and evaluated and may be revised, amended, or extended accordingly, based upon existing evidence and recommendations by the appropriate authorities.





THIRD REVISED PROCLAMATION OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE GUILFORD COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR AND IN CONSULTATION WITH THE GUILFORD COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTOR

RESTRICTING MOVEMENT OF ALL INDIVIDUALS LIVING, WORKING AND OTHERWISE CONDUCTING ACTIVITIES WITHIN GUILFORD COUNTY, THE CITIES OF GREENSBORO, HIGH POINT, AND GIBSONVILLE, AND WITHIN THE TOWNS OF JAMESTOWN, SUMMERFIELD, STOKESDALE, OAK RIDGE, WHITSETT, SEDALIA, AND PLEASANT GARDEN EFFECTIVE 5:00PM FRIDAY APRIL 10, 2020.

TO STAY AT THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE EXCEPT THAT THEY MAY LEAVE TO PROVIDE OR RECEIVE CERTAIN ESSENTIAL SERVICES OR ENGAGE IN CERTAIN ESSENTIAL ACTIVITIES AND WORK FOR ESSENTIAL BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL SERVICES;

EXEMPTING INDIVIDUALS LIVING WITHOUT SHELTER FROM THE RESTRICTION BUT URGING THEM TO FIND SHELTER;

RESTRICTING ALL BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO CEASE NON-ESSENTIAL OPERATIONS REQUIRING PUBLIC MOBILITY WITHIN THE LOCATIONS WITHIN THE COUNTY; RESTRICTING ALL NON-ESSENTIAL GATHERINGS OF INDIVIDUALS; AND ALL NON-ESSENTIAL TRAVEL

WHEREAS, The North Carolina General Assembly has adopted Article 1A of Chapter 166A of the General Statutes, entitled “North Carolina Emergency Management Act”, which sets forth the authority and responsibility of the Governor, State agencies, and local governments in prevention of, preparation for, response to, and recovery from natural or man-made emergencies; and

WHEREAS, G.S. §166A-19.22, which is part of the North Carolina Emergency Management Act, authorizes counties to declare a state of emergency under conditions and following procedures contained in G.S. §166A-19.22; and

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has created a state of emergency in the County of Guilford; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has declared a state of emergency on behalf of the state of North Carolina on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, Guilford County in conjunction with the of the Cities of Greensboro, High Point, and Gibsonville, along with the Towns of Jamestown, Summerfield, Stokesdale, Oak Ridge, Whitsett, Sedalia, and Pleasant Garden signed a State of Emergency Declaration on March 13, 2020; and

WHEREAS, Guilford County amended the State of Emergency Declaration on March 24, 2020 adding prohibitions on gatherings and the use of playground equipment; and

WHEREAS, since execution of the Declaration, residents of the county have been tested for the COVID-19 virus. Initially, there was a connection and correlation between positive results and out of county travel or contact with someone known or believed to have been positive; however as of March 24, 2020 there were sixteen (16) cases of COVID-19 in the County, as well as increasing evidence of cases in neighboring counties, including a significant and increasing number of suspected cases of community transmission and likely further significant increases in transmission. Widespread testing of COVID-19 is not yet available but is expected to increase in the coming days. This Declaration and Order is necessary to slow the rate of spread; and

WHEREAS, Guilford County amended the State of Emergency Declaration, effective March 27, 2020, and again, effective March 30, 2020 at 5:00 pm, adding prohibitions restricting movement of all individuals living, working and otherwise conducting activities within Guilford County, the cities of Greensboro, High Point, and Gibsonville, and within the towns of Jamestown, Summerfield, Stokesdale, Oak Ridge, Whitsett, Sedalia, and Pleasant Garden, requiring them to minimize travel and stay at their place of residence except that they may leave to provide or receive certain essential services or engage in certain essential activities and work for essential businesses and governmental services; and

WHEREAS, the Governor issued Executive Order No. 121 on March 27, 2020, effective Monday, March 30, 2020 at 5:00 pm, adding prohibitions restricting movement of all individuals currently within the State of North Carolina, requiring them to stay at their place of residence except that they may leave to provide or receive certain essential services or engage in certain essential activities and work for essential businesses and governmental service; and

WHEREAS, scientific evidence and best practices regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 particularly, and evidence that age, condition and health of a significant portion of the population of the County places the population at risk of serious health complications, including death from COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, this Proclamation addresses the “Essential Critical Infrastructure Workforce” and restrictions, and those exceptions to the restrictions on Guilford County

residents and those who work in Guilford County. The categories of essential services and business addressed in this order include healthcare and public health; law enforcement, public safety and first responders; food and agriculture; energy; water and wastewater; transportation and logistics; public works; communication and information technology; other community-based government operations and essential functions, including human services; other community-based human service operations; critical manufacturing; and hazardous materials as defined in the “Memorandum on Identification of Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers during COVID-19 Response” from US Department of Homeland Security; and

WHEREAS, many individuals who contract the virus display no symptoms or have mild symptoms which means they may not be aware they carry the virus. People without symptoms can transmit the disease and because evidence shows the disease is easily spread, mass gatherings can result in further transmissions of the virus; and

WHEREAS, it is essential to slow viral transmission as much as possible to protect the most vulnerable and to prevent the health care system from being overwhelmed; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the control measures implemented to date, the number of persons in Guilford County and in other populous North Carolina counties infected with COVID-19 virus has continued to rise; and

WHEREAS, this Third Revised Proclamation is necessary to slow the rate of the spread and is the least restrictive based upon the current evidence.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:

This Proclamation is to ensure that the maximum number of people self-isolate in their places of residence to the maximum extent feasible, while enabling essential services to continue to slow the spread of COVID-19 to the maximum extent possible. When people need to leave their places of residence, whether to obtain or perform essential services, or to otherwise facilitate authorized activities necessary for continuity of social and commercial life, they should at all times reasonably comply with CDC recommendations of Social Distancing Requirements of at least six (6) feet apart. Individuals whose residences are unsafe or become unsafe, such as victims of domestic violence, are permitted and urged to leave their home and stay at a safe alternative location. For purposes of this Proclamation, homes or residences include hotels, motels, shared rental units, shelters, and similar facilities. All provisions of this Proclamation should be interpreted to effectuate this intent.

All individuals currently living within Guilford County including the Cities and Towns are restricted to shelter at their places of residence. All persons may leave their residences only for Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, to operate Essential Business (as defined below) or as otherwise defined in this Proclamation. All Essential Businesses are strongly encouraged to remain open. To the greatest extent feasible, Essential Businesses shall comply with Social Distancing requirements as defined by CDC. Further, all travel, by any persons, to, from, or within Guilford County is to be limited to that travel authorized herein. “Travel” as used

throughout this Proclamation does not include travel through Guilford County which does not originate in Guilford County and does not involve a stop in Guilford County.

Non-essential business and operations must cease. All businesses and operations in the County, except Essential Businesses and Operations as defined below, are to cease all activities within the County except Minimum Basic Operations, as defined below. Businesses may continue operations consisting exclusively of employees or contractors performing activities at their own residences (i.e., working from home).

Prohibited activities. All public and private gatherings of more than ten (10) people (“Mass Gatherings”) are prohibited, except for the limited purposes permitted by this Proclamation. A Mass Gathering is defined as any event or convening that brings together more than ten (10) persons in a single room or single space at the same time. A single space may include facilities such as an auditorium, stadium, arena, conference room, meeting hall, theater, or any other confined indoor or outdoor space. A confined outdoor space includes, without limitation, a parking lot, yard, field, lot, public square, courtyard, amphitheater or outdoor performing venue. Nothing herein prohibits the gathering of members of a household or residence.

All places of public amusement where people may gather, whether indoors or outdoors, including but not limited to, locations with amusement rides, carnivals, amusement parks, water parks, aquariums, zoos, museums, arcades, fairs, children’s play centers, playgrounds, recreation centers, funplexes, bowling alleys, movie and other theaters, concert and music halls, and country clubs or social clubs shall be closed to the public.

This Proclamation supersedes the restrictions outlined in the State of Emergency Order from March 24, 2020 to Restrict Mass Gatherings, which prohibited gatherings of ten (10) people or more and supersedes the Revised Proclamation of the Chairman of the Guilford County Commissioners, issued on March 25, 2020 and effective on March 27, 2020 at 5:00 pm and the Second Revised Proclamation of the Chairman of the Guilford County Commissioners, issued on March 30, 2020 and effective on March 30, 2020 at 7:00 pm.

Restrictions on nursing homes, long term care facilities and assisted living facilities operated pursuant to Article 6 of NC General Statute Chapter 131E.

- a. Owners, administrators, operators, staff, contractors, and volunteers of nursing homes, long term care and assisted living facilities are prohibited from allowing residents, customers, clients, or visitors from assembly in spaces that do not permit appropriate social distancing which consists of separation of six (6) feet or more between each individual.

- b. Owners, administrators, operators, staff, contractors, and volunteers of nursing homes, long term care and assisted living facilities are prohibited from allowing a person to enter the facility and visit a resident unless each of the following criteria are met: (1) the visitor is an adult, (2) the resident has not already had a visitor that day; and (3) the visit takes place in the resident's room. This prohibition does not apply to end of life situations.
- c. No person is allowed to visit a resident of a nursing home, long term care or assisted living facility unless the visitor has been screened prior to entry for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 including the following: fever of 100.4 or higher, cough, or difficulty breathing, contact in past fourteen (14) days with a person who has a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19 or who is under investigation for COVID-19. All visitors may be required to take precautionary measures including, but not limited to, social distancing or wearing personal protective equipment.
- d. No person is allowed to visit a resident of a nursing home, long term care or an assisted living facility unless the visitor shows identification, signs into a visitor's log that includes the date and time in and time out , and provide their name and contact information including phone number and email if available.
- e. Operators and staff of nursing homes, long term care and assisted living facilities are prohibited from destroying each day's visitor log for a period of thirty (30) days from that day.
- f. Owners, administrators and operators shall ensure adequate staffing to manage all occupants of the facility to include lifting and moving uninjured occupants.
- g. All skilled nursing facilities must, in addition to the standards enumerated herein must comply with all relevant requirements set out in Executive Order 131 and subsequent amendments thereto.

Prohibited and permitted travel. All travel, including, but not limited to, travel by automobile, motorcycle, scooter, train, plane, or public transit, except Essential Travel and Essential Activities as defined herein or otherwise defined in this Proclamation, is prohibited. People riding on public transit must comply with Social Distancing Requirements to the greatest extent feasible. This Proclamation allows travel into or out of the County only for Essential Activities and to maintain Essential Businesses and Operations and Minimum Basic Operations, as each is defined below.

1. **Leaving the home for essential activities is permitted.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave and return to their residence only to perform any of the following Essential Activities:

- a. **For health and safety.** To engage in activities or perform tasks essential to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members (including, but not limited to, pets), such as, by way of example only and without limitation, seeking emergency services, obtaining medical supplies or medication, or visiting a health care professional for medical services that cannot be provided virtually.
 - b. **For necessary supplies and services.** To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves and their family or household members, or to deliver those services or supplies to others, such as, by way of example only and without limitation, groceries and food, household consumer products (such as cleaning and personal care products, but not, for example, furniture, mattresses, or vaping supplies), supplies they need to work from home, and products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences.
 - c. **For outdoor activity.** To engage in outdoor activity, provided the individuals comply with Social Distancing Requirements, as defined herein, such as, by way of example and without limitation, walking, hiking, golfing, running, cycling, or using the greenways. Individuals may go to public parks and open outdoor recreation areas. However, playgrounds may increase spread of COVID-19, and therefore shall be closed. Outdoor activity means outside exercise and/or recreational activity. It does not include outside activity for other purposes.
 - d. **For certain types of work.** To perform work providing essential products and services at Essential Businesses or Operations (which, as defined below, includes Healthcare and Public Health Operations, Human Services Operations, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Infrastructure) or to otherwise carry out activities specifically permitted in this Executive Order, including Minimum Basic Operations.
 - e. **To take care of others.** To care for a family member, friend, or pet in another household, and to transport family members, friends, or pets as allowed by this Executive Order.
2. **Elderly people and those who are vulnerable** as a result of illness should take additional precautions. People at high risk of severe illness from COVID-19, including elderly people and those who are sick, are urged to stay in their residence to the extent possible except as necessary to seek medical care. Nothing in this Proclamation prevents the Guilford County Public Health Director from issuing and enforcing isolation and quarantine orders or executing other duties as required pursuant to NCGS 130A.

3. **Healthcare and Public Health Operations.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave and return to their residence, to work for or obtain services through Healthcare and Public Health Operations.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations includes, but is not limited to: hospitals; clinics when medical/dental care cannot be provided virtually; pharmacies; public health entities, including those that compile, model, analyze and communicate public health information; pharmaceutical, pharmacy, medical device and equipment, and biotechnology companies (including operations, research and development, manufacture, and supply chain); organizations collecting blood, platelets, plasma, and other necessary materials; reproductive health care providers; home healthcare services providers; mental health and substance use providers; other healthcare facilities and suppliers and providers of any related and/or ancillary healthcare services; and entities that transport and dispose of medical materials and remains.

Specifically included in Healthcare and Public Health Operations are manufacturers, technicians, logistics, and warehouse operators and distributors of medical equipment, personal protective equipment (PPE), medical gases, pharmaceuticals, blood and blood products, vaccines, testing materials, laboratory supplies, cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting or sterilization supplies, and tissue and paper towel products.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations also includes veterinary care and all urgent healthcare services provided to animals.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of healthcare, broadly defined. Healthcare and Public Health Operations does not include fitness and exercise gyms, spas, salons, barber shops, tattoo parlors, and similar facilities.

4. **Human Services Operations.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave and return to their residence to work for or obtain services that are not available via online or mail-in applications, and telephone interviews at any Human Services Operations, or Medicaid providers that are providing services sought by the public and including state-operated, institutional, or community-based settings providing human services sought by the public.

Human Services Operations include, but is not limited to: long-term care facilities; residential settings and shelters for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness; transitional facilities; home-based settings to provide services to

individuals with physical, intellectual, and/or developmental disabilities, seniors, adults, and children; field offices that provide and help to determine eligibility for basic needs including food, cash assistance, medical coverage, child care, vocational services, rehabilitation services; developmental centers; adoption agencies; businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged individuals, individuals with physical, intellectual, and/or developmental disabilities, or otherwise needy individuals.

Human Services Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of human services, broadly defined.

5. **Essential Infrastructure.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave and return to their residence to provide any services or perform any work necessary to offer, provide, operate, maintain and repair Essential Infrastructure.

Essential Infrastructure includes, but is not limited to: food and beverage production, distribution, and sale; construction (including, but not limited to, construction required in response to this public health emergency, hospital construction, construction of long term care facilities, public works construction, commercial construction and residential construction); building management and maintenance; airport operations; operation and maintenance of utilities, including water, sewer, and gas; electrical (including power generation, distribution, and production of raw materials); distribution centers; security system operation and maintenance; oil and biofuel refining; roads, highways, railroads, air transport, and public transportation; ports; cybersecurity operations; flood control; solid waste and recycling collection and removal; and internet, video, and telecommunications systems (including the provision of essential global, national, and local infrastructure for computing services, business infrastructure, communications, and web-based services).

Essential Infrastructure shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to essential infrastructure, broadly defined.

6. **Essential Governmental Functions.** For purposes of this Proclamation, all first responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, law enforcement and corrections personnel, hazardous materials responders, child protection and child welfare personnel, adult protection services, housing and shelter personnel, military, and other governmental employees working for or to support Essential Businesses and Operations are categorically exempt.

Essential Government Functions means all services provided by the County or any municipality, township, subdivision or agency of government and needed to ensure the continuing operation of the government agencies or to provide for or support the health, safety and welfare of the public, and including contractors performing

Essential Government Functions. Each County, City or Town Manager shall determine its Essential Governmental Functions and identify employees and/or contractors necessary to the performance of those functions.

This Proclamation does not apply to the NC state or federal government. Nothing herein shall prohibit any individual from performing or accessing Essential Governmental Functions.

7. **Businesses covered by this Proclamation.** For the purposes of this Proclamation, covered businesses include any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entities, regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.

Essential Businesses and Operations. For purposes of this Proclamation, Essential Businesses and Operations means Healthcare and Public Health Operations, Human Services Operations, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Infrastructure, and the following:

1. **Stores that sell groceries and medicine.** Grocery stores, pharmacies, certified farmers' markets, farm and produce stands, supermarkets, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged, in significant part, in the retail sale of groceries, canned food, dry goods, frozen foods, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supplies, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, alcohol and nonalcoholic beverages and any other household consumer products (such as cleaning and personal care products, but not, for example, furniture, mattresses, or vaping supplies). This includes stores that, in significant part, sell groceries and/or medicine (including medication not requiring a medical prescription), and also sell other products. It also includes stores that, in significant part, sell products necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences and Essential Businesses and Operations;
2. **Food, beverage, and agriculture.** Food and beverage manufacturing, production, processing, and cultivation, including farming, livestock, fishing, baking, and other production agriculture, including cultivation, marketing, production, and distribution of animals and goods for consumption; and businesses that provide food, shelter, and other necessities of life for animals, including animal shelters, rescues, shelters, kennels, and adoption facilities;
3. **Organizations that provide charitable and social services.** Businesses and religious and secular nonprofit organizations, including food banks, when providing food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals, individuals who need assistance as a result of this emergency, and people with disabilities;

4. Media. Newspapers, television, radio, and other media services;
5. Gas stations and businesses needed for transportation. Gas stations, auto-supply, auto-repair, towing services, fully automated car wash facilities, including interior sanitizing (self-service operations that are not fully automated will not be used), so long as they are fully compliant with Executive Order 131 and any amendments thereto, bicycle shops, and related facilities;
6. Financial institutions. Banks, currency exchanges, consumer lenders, including but not limited, to payday lenders, pawnbrokers, consumer installment lenders and sales finance lenders, credit unions, appraisers, title companies, financial markets, trading and futures exchanges, affiliates of financial institutions, entities that issue bonds, related financial institutions, and institutions selling financial products;
7. Hardware and supply stores. Hardware stores and businesses that, in significant part, sell electrical, plumbing, and heating material;
8. Critical trades. Building and Construction Tradesmen and Tradeswomen, and other trades including but not limited to plumbers, electricians, exterminators, cleaning and janitorial staff for commercial and governmental properties, security staff, operating engineers, HVAC, painting, moving and relocation services, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences, Essential Activities, and Essential Businesses and Operations;
9. Mail, post, shipping, logistics, delivery, and pick-up services. Post offices and other businesses that provide shipping and delivery services, and businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, goods or services to end users or through commercial channels;
10. Educational institutions. Educational institutions—including public and private pre-K-12 schools, colleges, and universities—for purposes of facilitating distance learning, performing critical research related to COVID-19, providing coordinated child care for healthcare workers, or performing essential functions, provided that social distancing of six (6) feet per person is maintained to the greatest extent possible. This Proclamation is consistent with and does not amend or supersede NC Governor’s March 10, 2020 Executive Order, except that affected schools are ordered closed through May 15, 2020; the Guilford School System remains under the command and control of the superintendent of schools.
11. Laundry services. Laundromats, dry cleaners, industrial laundry services, and laundry service providers;

12. Restaurants for consumption off-premises. Restaurants and other similar facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for consumption off-premises, through such means as in-house delivery, third-party delivery, drive-through, curbside pick-up, and carry-out. Schools and other entities that typically provide food services to students or members of the public may continue to do so under this Executive Order on the condition that the food is provided to students or members of the public on a pick-up and takeaway basis only. Schools and other entities that provide food services under this exemption shall not permit the food to be eaten at the site where it is provided, or at any other gathering site due to the virus's propensity to physically impact surfaces and personal property;
13. Supplies to work from home. Businesses that, in significant part, sell, manufacture, or supply products needed for people to work from home;
14. Supplies for Essential Businesses and Operations. Businesses that sell, manufacture, or supply other Essential Businesses and Operations with the support or materials necessary to operate, including computers, audio and video electronics, household appliances; IT and telecommunication equipment; hardware, paint, flat glass; electrical, plumbing and heating material; sanitary equipment; personal hygiene products; food, food additives, ingredients and components; medical and orthopedic equipment; optics and photography equipment; diagnostics, food and beverages, chemicals, soaps and detergent; and firearm and ammunition suppliers and retailers for purposes of safety and security;
15. Transportation. Airport operations, airlines, taxis, public transportation, transportation network providers (such as Uber and Lyft), vehicle sales and rental services, paratransit, and other private, and commercial transportation and logistics providers necessary for Essential Activities and other purposes expressly authorized herein; however, vehicle marketing and sales activities are only permitted as long as they are fully compliant with the 'Guilford County Guidelines for Car Sales' as amended (which is incorporated herein by reference).
16. Home-based care and services. Home-based care for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness, including caregivers such as nannies who may travel to the child's home to provide care, and other in-home services including meal delivery;
17. Residential facilities and shelters. Residential facilities and shelters for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness;

18. Professional services. Professional services, such as legal services, accounting services, insurance services, and real estate services (including but not limited to appraisal and title services); real estate broker/agent services involving human interaction and/or viewing the interior of residences or other structures shall be conducted remotely (online, phone, fax, e-mail, etc.) except that once an agreement to purchase/lease has been executed by the parties to a prospective transaction, a first walkthrough of the property under contract may take place and, prior to closing, a second and final walkthrough may take place, provided that each such walkthrough (a) shall include (whether simultaneously or sequentially) at most the buyer's agent/broker and the buyer (for this purpose, buyer shall include up to two (2) persons in instances where the buyer consists of more than one (1) person or consists of a legal entity other than a person); (b) shall (as with all Essential Businesses) follow Social Distancing Requirements to the fullest extent possible; and (c) shall comply with then-current guidance from the National Association of Realtors for walkthroughs during COVID-19. Any photographs/video of the interior of residences or other structures used in the marketing or sale/lease of real estate that are created while this Proclamation is in effect must be shot/taken by a person who normally occupies the residence or structure.
19. Childcare centers for specific employees exempted by this Proclamation. Childcare facilities providing services that enable first responders, healthcare workers, public health, NC DHHS staff and others responding to COVID-19.
20. Manufacture, distribution, and supply chain for critical products and industries. Manufacturing companies, distributors, and supply chain companies producing and supplying essential products and services in and for industries such as pharmaceutical, technology, biotechnology, healthcare, chemicals and sanitization, waste pickup and disposal, agriculture, food and beverage, transportation, energy, steel and steel products, petroleum and fuel, mining, construction, national defense, communications, as well as essential products and services used by other Essential Businesses and Operations.
21. Hotels and motels. Hotels and motels, to the extent used for lodging and delivery or carry-out food services.
22. Funeral services. Funeral, mortuary, cremation, burial, cemetery, and related services. No more than ten (10) persons may attend (whether simultaneously or sequentially) any separate part of the funeral proceedings (for example, visitation, indoor service, graveside service, etc. are each a separate part of a funeral proceeding).
23. Religious entities. Religious entities for the purpose of: 1) live-streaming or similar real-time electronic dissemination of religious services from their facility

provided that any activities for this purpose shall include only those persons necessary to perform the live streaming or similar real-time electronic dissemination and in any event no more than ten (10) persons; or 2) 'Drive-in' religious services as long as they are fully compliant with the 'Guilford County Guidelines for "Drive-in" Religious Services' as amended (which is incorporated herein by reference).

Minimum Basic Operations. For purposes of this Proclamation, Minimum Basic Operations include the following, provided that employees comply with Social Distancing Requirements, to the extent possible, while carrying out such operations:

1. The minimum necessary activities to maintain the value of the business's inventory, preserve the condition of the business's physical plant and equipment, ensure security, process payroll and employee benefits, or for related functions.
2. The minimum necessary activities to facilitate employees of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their residences.

Essential Travel. For purposes of this Proclamation, Essential Travel includes travel for any of the following purposes. Individuals engaged in any Essential Travel must comply with all Social Distancing Requirements as defined herein.

1. Any travel related to the provision of or access to Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, Essential Businesses and Operations, or Minimum Basic Operations.
2. Travel to care for elderly, minors, dependents, persons with disabilities, or other vulnerable persons.
3. Travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services.
4. Travel to return to a place of residence from outside the jurisdiction.
5. Travel required by law enforcement or court order, including to transport children pursuant to a custody agreement.
6. Travel required for non-residents to return to their place of residence outside the County. Individuals are strongly encouraged to verify that their transportation out of the County remains available and functional prior to commencing such travel.

Social Distancing Requirements. For purposes of this Proclamation, Social Distancing Requirements includes maintaining at least six (6) foot social distancing from other individuals,

washing hands with soap and water for at least twenty (20) seconds as frequently as possible or using hand sanitizer, covering coughs or sneezes (into the sleeve or elbow, not hands), regularly cleaning high-touch surfaces, and not shaking hands.

Required measures. Essential Businesses and Operations and businesses engaged in Minimum Basic Operations must take proactive measures to ensure compliance with Social Distancing Requirements, including where possible:

1. Designate six (6) foot distances. Designating with signage, tape, or by other means six (6) foot spacing for employees and customers in line to maintain appropriate distance;
2. Hand sanitizer and sanitizing products. Having hand sanitizer and sanitizing products readily available for employees and customers;
3. Separate operating hours for vulnerable populations. Implementing separate operating hours for elderly and vulnerable customers; and
4. Online and remote access. Posting online whether a facility is open and how best to reach the facility and continue services by phone or remotely.
5. Additional social distancing requirements set forth in Executive Order 131. In addition to the requirements set out herein all operating retail establishments must comply with all the requirements set forth in Executive Order 131 and subsequent amendments thereto.

This Proclamation is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the March 24, State of Emergency Declaration from Guilford County and the Proclamation of the State of Emergency issued by the Governor on March 10, 2020.

This Proclamation will be valid through April 16, 2020 but will be regularly reviewed and evaluated and may be revised, amended, extended accordingly, based upon existing evidence and recommendations by the Public Health Director and Guilford County Emergency Management.

Any person violating any prohibition or restriction imposed by this proclamation as authorized by the Proclamation of State of Emergency shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor in accordance with G.S. 14-288.20A.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Proclamation is for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Proclamation. The signatories hereby declare that it would have passed this Proclamation and each section, subsection, clause, and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared invalid.

This Proclamation is adopted on the 10th day of April, 2020 and shall take effect on April 10, 2020 at 5:00 pm.

GUILFORD COUNTY GUIDELINES
REGARDING AUTOMOBILE DEALERS

Detailed Plan of Action

- 1) All dealership operations shall be fully compliant with all the requirements set out in Executive Order 131.
- 2) Motor vehicle sales conducted by appointment.
- 3) Posting online whether a facility is open and how best to reach the facility and continue services by phone or remotely.
- 4) Designate six-foot distances with signage, tape, or by other means, six-foot spacing for employees and customers to maintain appropriate distance and maintaining at least six-foot social distancing from other individuals.
- 4) No more than ten (10) people, including customers and employees, in the showroom at any one time.
- 5) All customer lounges closed.
- 6) Tables available outside the showroom for customers who wish to conduct transaction outside of showroom.
- 7) Hand sanitizer and sanitizing products readily available for employees and customers.
- 8) No test drives permitted unless expressly requested by the purchaser and only conducted in adherence to the following requirements:
 - a. Vehicle are completely sanitized with COVID-19 approved products after every test drive with a card stating time it was driven and when it was sanitized.
 - b. No sales representative riding in vehicle with a customer.
 - c. Customer to wear gloves that are provided by dealership while test driving vehicle.
 - d. Disposable seat mats to be used for the test drive.
 - e. Vehicles test driven will not be driven by another potential customer for 72 hours.
- 9) To the extent legally possible, conduct off-site / home delivery of vehicles.
- 10) Adhere to a n y CDC recommendations in addition to Executive Order 131 for maintaining a safe workplace, including the measures referenced above as well as:
 - a. Identify customers and employees who have viral symptoms and prohibit them from entering the dealership.
 - b. Require what the CDC calls “respiratory etiquette,” including covering coughs and sneezes
 - c. Provide customers and employees with tissues and trash receptacles.
 - d. Prohibit employees from using other employees’ phones, desks, offices, work tools and equipment.
 - e. Prohibit hand shaking and other physical contact between individuals.
 - f. Post handwashing signs around the dealership.

GUILFORD COUNTY GUIDELINES
REGARDING 'DRIVE-IN' RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Detailed Plan of Action

1) Adherence to the following requirements specified in Guilford County's Stay at Home Order for those businesses classified as Essential Businesses and Operations:

- Requires COVID-19 Essential Businesses and Operations, to the maximum extent possible, to direct employees to work from home or telework.
- Requires COVID-19 Essential Businesses and Operations, to the extent practicable, to maintain the following Social Distancing Requirements:
 - a. Maintaining at least six (6) feet distancing from other individuals; **Note:** Many activities commonplace to religious activities, such as handing out literature, taking communion, and personal collection of tithes are incompatible with social distancing and must be avoided.
 - b. Washing hands using soap and water for at least twenty (20) seconds as frequently as possible and numerous times throughout the day or the use of hand sanitizer;
 - c. Regular cleaning high-touch surfaces.

2) Drive-in services permitted only once per week.

3) All members not actively engaged in presenting the service must remain in their vehicles.

4) There must be at least six (6) feet of separation between the sides of vehicles, i.e., cars must have a parking space of separation. Designate six-foot distances with signage, tape, or by other means. Leaving an empty, marked parking space at least six (6) foot wide between each vehicle is compliant.

5) There must be at least six (6) feet of separation between presenters and also between presenters and vehicle occupants.

4) Only family members within each vehicle.

5) No buses or vans except for minivans.

6) Vehicle occupancy is limited to the number of seating spaces equipped with seatbelts.

7) No seating in truck beds or on vehicle exteriors is permitted.

8) No more than fifty (50) vehicles.
