
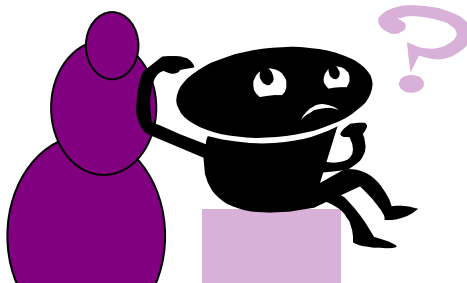





## Home Grown eBooks.

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**High Point Public Library** and **NC LIVE** now offer a new eBook project that gives North Carolina library patrons *unlimited* access to more than 1,400 eBook titles from North Carolina-based publishers. This collection offers a wide range of content, including novels by popular North Carolina authors, poetry, short stories, and non-fiction. The eBooks are available for public use on the BiblioBoard platform from <http://nclive.org/ebooks> and on North Carolina library websites.

### 1. Can I read them on my tablet?

Yes! The **BiblioBoard Library app** is available for iPad®, Kindle Fire®, Nexus® tablets, and Galaxy® tablets. On the BiblioBoard website, click on the yellow “tablet” icon in the upper-right corner. Follow the steps to create your own account. Last, download the “BiblioBoard Library” app from the app store (for whatever version of device you’re using). If the app asks you to select your library’s name, select “NONE” and log in with the account you created.

### 2. Will I have to place any holds for a title I want?

No! Because they are simultaneous access titles, there is no need for a holds list, checkout limits, or returns.

### 3. Do I need a wireless internet connection to access these?

You do if you’re reading through the browser. However, within the app you can choose to download them to an offline bookshelf. There is a “+” in the upper right corner.

How do I access them? There are a few ways.

One, log into the *High Point Public Library* catalog, and search for: “NC Live Home Grown eBook Collection”. A list will result and you can narrow by subject. Choose your title you want, click the “More Options” button which will take you to a redirect screen. You’re then at the Biblioboard page where you can access the title. Click the “Read” button and you can start reading the books in the browser.

Three, you can download the app to your mobile device. Further instructions for this are on the back in the FAQ section.

This novel tells the story of three generations of a family living on the Appalachian frontier in the 18th and 19th century. Each section is told in the distinctive voice of a different family member, and the events of the narrative are based on stories handed down through Morgan's family.
